The papers of William Styron, author and novelist, were given to the Library of Congress by his father, William C. Styron Sr., and by the author, 1964-1968. An addition was given by Thomas F. Gossett in 1966.

The papers of William Styron were housed and described in 1991 by Martha Hopkins. The finding aid was revised in 2013. In 2023, the finding aid was revised by Matthew Darby and material rehoused and consolidated to promote preservation.

The papers of William Styron (1925-2006) span the years 1951-1968 and consist chiefly of holograph drafts and corrected galleys of books and articles by Styron including his novels titled *Lie Down in Darkness* (1951), *The Long March* (1955), *Set This House on Fire* (1960), and *The Confessions of Nat Turner* (1967). Also includes correspondence, speeches, reviews, research material, clippings, and photographs pertaining to his life and literary works.
